Canal Town Nursey School Annual Report 2022

Canal Town Nursery School finally ended its triumphant existence in August. In January, our class of three-year olds was busy and building socialization skills. They learned songs, their colors, where to sit, how to walk in a straight line, how to listen and how to work in groups. During the winter, activities in the muscle room were joyful and nearly riotous in skill races. The class size was only twelve. Mommy and Tot numbers were even reduced this year.

When the open house was offered in March, only four families signed up. We as a board were surprised. Despite numerous attempts at communications, flyers, and message boards, no more families signed up.

Graduation was a wonderful event. Nearly the entire bottom of the church pews was filled with parents and grandparents. They then went outside for family pictures and ice cream.

On a positive note, the second annual summer camp was very successful with an average of 12 campers for each of the two weeks.

Following graduation, the board became aware that the previous instructors would not be returning. As a result, a determined effort of searching for candidates and interviews occurred. Sadly no one was found. As we moved into August without a teacher or aide and only four students signed up with no expressed interest appearing, the board made the awful decision to close the school. The other pressure came from the financial responsibility to pay the teachers and director a fair wage. As per New York State Law, prices had to rise and with the decreasing population demographics, we would not survive the opening.

But there is always hope and the CE Committee is committed to helping the youth of Palmyra. New and interceding things are stirring. The Board of Directors would like to thank the session for their understanding and Irene Fadden and Phil Opdycke for straightening out all the final finances. \$217 in scholarship funds were left in the checking account. We decided to give the funds back to the Rotary Club for scholarships.

Christian Education Ministry Team Annual Report 2022

Building Faith, Family, and Fellowship. WPC nurtures spiritual growth, joyful fellowship, meaningful community, and global involvement: worshiping and serving God with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love.

The CE team of 2022 consisted of Ellen Avery, Emily Hunt (Chairperson), Cim McFarlane (Sunday School Director, as a non-elected member) and Jody Pruitt. We work as a team with the congregation “to tell the story of love and grace we have received from God, because it is a story we love to tell!”

2022 was a year that seemed a little more normal. We had in-person Sunday School with weekly attendance ranging from 3-8 children, with 1 teen teacher and 2 adult teachers. We continue to use a multi-age class with children ranging from ages 3-13. Teachers are using a curriculum for multi-age classes called Growing in Grace and Gratitude. For the 2022-2023 school year, the youth arranged their own space. They chose the furniture, layout, and included a snack and coffee/hot chocolate bar.

Cim continues to provide leadership for:

- Attending Sunday School each week, prepping the classroom before class and cleaning up the classroom after class.
- Selecting curriculum for Sunday School.
- Selecting and organizing Sunday School teachers.
- Orchestrating three Children-Lead Worship services (Epiphany, Pentecost, and post-VBS)- providing full scope of planning and executing.
- Sent a back-to-school video to all Sunday School and VBS families.
- Planning the making of holiday cards for WPC shut-ins, residents of the ARC home, and WPC college students for Valentine’s Day, Easter, and Christmas (a minimum of 40 cards are made).
- Summer Vacation Bible School (combined sponsors with Palmyra Reformed Church)- 2022’s theme was Weird Animals. Children made crafts, played games, listened to Bible stories, and sang lots of songs. 42 children attended and 22 adults and teens volunteered.
- Promoting Camp Whitman- 4 WPC youth, 1 WPC adult attended camp in the summer of 2022.
- Orchestrating the Palm Sunday Parade.
- Orchestrating the youth group event with the PRC- Winter Holiday Festival of Lights in December. WPC youth attended and enjoyed the light display and wagon ride. Pizza was enjoyed at church afterwards.

- Promoting Presbyterian Youth Triennium which turned into All Roads Lead to Watson for local Presbyterian youth at Painted Post.
- Orchestrating the children’s chimes with Patti Squire and Jacob McFarlane for the 2022 Epiphany service.
- Taking an administrative role with the Canal Town Nursery School Facebook page. Sent out preschool age family activities.

Under the leadership of the CE Team:

- Co-hosted two Bible Trivia Nights with the Fellowship Team.
- Worked at the Canal Town Days water table in front of WPC.
- Passed out candy and a worship invitation to over 500 youth at the Trick or Treat on Main Street event.
- Presented gifts to graduating seniors- presented to two seniors in 2022.
- Presented 2nd grade Bibles to two 2nd graders in 2022.
- With the help of Reverend Nancy J. Farrell, we commissioned 3 Sunday School teachers in 2022.
- Provided two cover letters for the WPC newsletter, the Spire.
- Hosted coffee hour.
- Provided an intergenerational Fall Fun Fest activity after worship.

The team works to provide Christian Education, leadership, and mission opportunities for both adults and children in a loving and caring way- “Together let us tell the story of love and grace we have received from God, because it is a story we love to tell!”

The Deacons Ministry Team Annual Report for 2022

The Deacons Ministry Team of 2022 consisted of Sara Bush, Patricia Dlugosh, Esther Hargrave, Randy Kennard (Chairperson), Sylvia Lyon, Sandy McMenamin, and Nancy Talma, with Linda Pulcini as a prayerful supporter.

Our committee sadly lost one member early this year, Fred Coffman. However, we gained a prayer warrior, Patty Dlugosh. We treasure the gifts Fred has brought to the Deacons and now welcome the gifts that Patty will share. We are blessed with both of these amazing members. Come 2023 we have another faithful prayer warrior that will be stepping down, Esther Hargrave. She will create a significant hole in our team. We will miss her humor as well as her faithful caring and power packed prayers.

The Deacon's team is slowly resuming active outreach in person as we all learn how to function in a post pandemic world where versions of Covid still are present. Thus, we struggle with the role of being there for our congregation while still offering distance to keep all safe. It is forever healing to know that an increase in personal visits is possible. Some nursing homes are still requiring Covid testing prior to entering. When we visit, we plan accordingly.

We continue to humbly minister to our congregation in the following ways:

Prayer – By naming those in need and sharing their struggles up to the Lord in prayer is the most important honor we have in serving our faith community. The act of praying is taken very seriously as we wear the responsibility of carrying those in need in our hearts. Weekly the names of those are listed in the church bulletin so that others can join their prayers with ours. Believing in the power of prayer is a grace-filled gift that we can offer. Those listed and those kept confidential are held dearly. We welcome all that join with us to lift all up in pray-full awareness to God those who are broken in body or spirit.

Cards and Notes – Whether it is through cards of encouragement, or celebrating of birthdays and anniversaries, cards are the mainstay of our outreach. We include Biblical scriptures along with a personal uplifting message. It is important that folks know we carry them in our hearts and prayers, that they are not alone. There are an identified group of recipients that receive monthly cards and wishes to reinforce them that we walk with them. This year we sent out over 650 cards/letters.

Visits – This year we have not increased our in-person visits that much due to continued constraints at nursing homes to ensure the safety of their residence. However, we have had a few more visit that were realized in 2021, about 84. Along with visits, we have remained in contact with those in need in our faith community via phone. One concern is that when folks are less visible, we are less aware of their needs. We are ever vigilant to be there as much as is possible.

Communion – There has been a transition in the sharing of the elements during communion. In April we changed from serving pre-packaged elements to offering the elements in the small disposable plastic cups. The bread is cut and placed in cups as well to mitigate any spreading of germs. (The pre-packaged containers pose to be a challenge in opening.) How we obtain the count for who has received communion has changed. Previously we used the Covid sign-in sheets to count who partook in communion. Now that we are reverting to a pre-covid protocol, we are counting the actual cups used. Those on zoom are not included in the counts.

Flowers – Easter lilies, Christmas poinsettias along with flowers from other sources have been presented and delivered to congregants throughout the year.

Special Cards – We are so very thankful to our Sunday School children and leaders who have made cards for us to send to shut-ins and those of special needs. They graciously created unique cards for Valentine’s Day, Easter, and Christmas. We have had many glowing statements of appreciation for these unique cards. The Deacons also appreciate the time, talent and energy given to this effort.

Finance Team – Year End Report For 2022

For 2022, in another year without a full time Minister, we at Western Presbyterian Church never missed a beat and continued full financial support for our ongoing programs in Worship, Christian Education, and generous Mission Outreach to both local and extended global communities while maintaining our operating budget. A special thank you goes out to Sue Leonard and the worship team for suppling some of the best pulpit supply ministers there are. The source of funds for the church that is shown below underscores the importance of member donations. Without the faithful and generous contributions of our members, the important work of our church would not be able to continue. In 2022 there were approximately 85 active members who donated \$83,911.00 for the operation of WPC. This amount represents 51.5 % of the church's total receipts. A sincere thank you to each and every one. Also in addition, our endowment funds provided 46.5 % (\$76,377.00) for the operation of our church. The balance of 2% or \$5,200.00 came from other donations & per capita.

The year 2022 was not without its financial challenges. We lost too many of our faithful seniors that were called home to be with the Lord or moved away leaving a large financial and support gap to fill. We still take the cost of snow plowing out of the Exterior Edifice account and utilities from Interior Edifice account. By moving these 2 items, it reduced operations by approximately \$7,000.00 dollars. Please notice, when you look at the 2022 final report of Receipts and Expenditures, the receipts cancelled the deficit and gave us a \$83,931.00 surplus to our budget (which would have been used to pay an Interim or full-time minister). This was due to increased giving from individuals, WPC Women's Association, all the WPC teams watching their expenses and not having a full-time minister. THANK YOU ALL VERY MUCH.

In a year which we saw increasing volatility and challenges in the financial markets, our financial investment management company, Howe and Rusling, professionally allocated and diversified our endowments to provide our portfolio capital to help fund the church operations as well as maintain and make improvements to the edifice interior and exterior.

WPC Finance Team consists of Eric Chapman (Treasurer), Val Gendron (Financial Secretary), Bill Bush, Alicia Lynch, and myself.

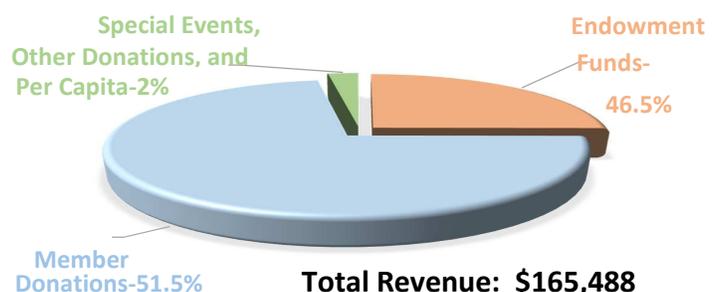

Mission and Social Concerns Team Annual Report for 2022

During 2022, the Mission and Social Concerns provided opportunities to help end hunger around the world, in the Presbytery, in Wayne Country, and in Palmyra-Macedon Communities. The total budgeted by the Session was \$6,783. Western Presbyterian gave much more to end hunger because of the GENEROSITY of the congregation. Thank you.

WPC supported the **Emergency Food Cupboard** that opened in Fall of 2021. The name on the cupboard says, "Take what you need, Leave what you can." Volunteers brought food to the cupboard throughout the year. The cupboard has been used by those needing food and supported by many in the congregation and community. Irene Fadden took pictures and Edie Chapman posted them on the Palmyra Neighbors Facebook Page and asked for community support for the cupboard. Besides food we put in diapers and pull-ups, incontinence underwear and feminine hygiene products, and lots of toilet paper.

There is a white cabinet on the landing, and it holds food to put in the cupboard as needed. Beside the cabinet are boxes that hold bags of diapers and pull ups. Everyone is welcome to fill the cupboard from the cabinet or with food purchased at the grocery store. We just try not to put out more than 6 rolls of toilet paper or 3 or 4 boxes of cereal at one time. If you don't have a key to the church, Kathy is in the office Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday and she'll let you in to get to the cabinet.

Instead of having a garden, the mission team used a donation from Terry Goodwin to purchase grow bags. Members of the congregation planted, cared for, and harvested the vegetables were put into the Food Cupboard or taken to the Food Pantry. Thank you to all who participated in this mission.

We learned that canned vegetables do freeze at low temperature, despite the salt used in the processing. Cereal is always needed. Some want and need the food cupboard so much that they will clean up broken jars, so it continues. Squirrels are a problem and like with bird feeders, we try to keep them out of the cupboard.

The **Food Pantry** located in Zion Episcopal has volunteers from WPC 3 evenings a month. Anyone wanting to help, should contact Ruth Dantz. Don Dantz orders food from Food Link and is present when the deliveries are made. He would welcome help, so give him a call.

During Advent, the congregation supported the food pantry with a Reverse Advent Calendar. The congregation brought in personal hygiene items, laundry soap, toilet paper, cleaning supplies, and all those things that SNAP benefits don't cover. The Cross Creek church brought items to WPC using the same calendar. Don Dantz, son Tim, and 2 grandsons sorted and packed 27 large boxes and took to the food pantry for the families who use the pantry.

Qholaqhoe Mountain Connections in Lesotho uses the money to provide schooling for children. High school costs \$250 per high school student and many of the families are subsistence farmers and simply can't afford high school. The newsletter reports that on the trip there this fall, there was happiness and pride in the communities despite the difficulties. The communities are seeing success in educating their children. College scholarships are also given by sponsors. If interested in becoming a sponsor for either high school or college or just learn more about the mission, the website is www.qmconnect.org.

The Clint McCoy Feeding Center in Mzenga, Malawi was established in 2010 through memorial gifts to honor the legacy of Rev. Clinton A. McCoy. The center provides a warm meal, simple games, and songs to over 80 young children two days a week. The money we send helps feed the children.

Healthy Ninos Honduras – from the newsletter “On a recent visit to the Piedra de Afilas village, Felix was delivering some of the water filtration systems. One of the village leaders approached Felix to express his gratitude, and he made the remarkable comment, ‘*The children in the village don’t get sick with diarrhea anymore! They hardly ever have to visit the center for GI problems like they used to.*’ WPC sent money to buy 10 water purification buckets. In November, we had a shoe drive, and six boxes of shoes were sent to Honduras for 2023 distribution. This is a special project which Rena Haigh has supported and involved WPC.

ARC Home Residents came to the annual picnic in September. Residents came and were delighted to eat with us. The Sunday School made cards and we delivered them to residents near Valentine’s Day with donuts, at Easter with cookies, and at Christmas with gift cards.

Good Neighbor Fund – In December of 2021 there was a fire in apartments in Macedon. The Good Neighbor Fund was one of the conduits to resettlement of the families. The resettlement went into the spring and John Cook and Wilma Redman played a major part in this project. \$2,000 given by WPC to support the Good Neighbor Fund. The Session applied for and received a grant for the Good Neighbor Fund from Presbytery. The grant was used by the GNF to help families with rent, car repair, heating, etc. At a community carol sing at Zion, a freewill offering was taken for the Good Neighbor Fund.

Meals on Wheels – We continue to support the cost of preparing meals being delivered to senior citizens.

During Lent, the Congregation participated in a donation with a **Caring is Sharing Calendar**. Money was put into a loaf bank and then on Palm Sunday it was collected and given to the Presbytery Hunger Fund for Presbytery Grants to Food Ministries throughout the Presbytery.

One Great Hour of Sharing donation was taken in October to support the PCUSA mission in the US and around the world.

Weekend Wellness was not supported financially this year. Weekend Wellness bags are given to about 70 school-aged children every week. This year, the bags are provided by Food Link at about \$5 less than what it costs Foodlink to provide them. In the 2022-2023 school year, we will need to pay the full cost of the bags of food or work with the food pantry for a way to distribute the food to keep children fed on the weekends. Edie is working with the food pantry, the school, and food link.

Family Promise is currently using an apartment model for serving homeless families, so we have not had families staying at the church since the pandemic began. Family Promise was not funded this year by WPC, but we did provide Monday evening meals, groceries as needed, and hospitality for 4 weeks in 2022. Thank you to all who provided meals, went to the Day Center for meals, and contacted the families.

Good Neighbor Fund – 2022 Annual Report

WEEKEND WELLNESS

2022 ANNUAL REPORT

*“For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat,

The Mission/Social Concerns Team continues to partner with the Palmyra-Macedon Central School District to ensure that our young children will not go hungry over the weekend.

Approximately 40% of the students in the in the Palmyra Macedon Central School District are eligible for free or reduced-price lunches. When these children are not in school on weekends, they may have less food than they need. This can result in a weaker immune system, increased hospitalization, lower IQ, shorter attention span, and lower academic achievement. The “Weekend Wellness” program helps to fill that need and ensure our children’s continued growth and development.

We continue to purchase pre-packaged food from Food Link on a monthly basis. This eliminates the need for volunteers to purchase and pack the food bags and is more cost effective. For the 2021-22 school year these bags cost \$3.00 each; we spent \$6,840.00. In September 2022 that cost increased to \$3.50 per bag.

Each week that school is in session, one team of our volunteers delivers the food to each of the four schools in the Pal-Mac school district. Teams are: (1) Edie Chapman, (2) Ruth & Don Dantz, (3) Randy & Steve Kennard, and (4) Ray Marr & Terry Gendron. Starting in September 2020, members of the Pal-Mac Rotary Club have volunteered their services to help with loading & deliveries. We greatly appreciate their assistance.

During the 2021-2022 school year, we delivered 2,279 bags of food. From September thru December of the 2022-2023 school year, we have delivered 680 bags.

We are grateful for the financial support we received this year from AEY Enterprises, Inc and Palmyra-Macedon Rotary Foundation Inc.

Significant Activities and Notes

Safety

Frequent replacement of fluorescent lights throughout the facility.

Updating fluorescent bulbs to LED bulbs as needed throughout the church continued thru the year.

Maintenance and Repair

Sanctuary furnaces were replaced with new paired units and new thermostats. Furnaces are more efficient than older units and eliminate use of chimney.

The church steeple needs to be repainted. Delay in receiving quotes now has pushed planned repair and repaint to spring/summer of 2023.

Mike Dube (local plaster specialist) has been contacted and plans to assess sanctuary wall and ceiling issues in early 2023.

Found issue with valve placement and function for heating of muscle room when system was started this year.

This also affects the heat in the office. Have secured and approved quote for repairs to start January 2023.

Will have 7 remaining thermostats replaced as part of same project.

Grounds

Yard clean-up: We maintained the grounds throughout the year by periodic trimming and tidying.

Added slate pieces to front lawn in front of Food cupboard.

Facility Investment

Internet Service: Investigating options for fiber internet and new phone service now that fiber internet has reached the area. Hope to have updates in early 2023.

Eagle Scout candidate from Troop 96 completed shelving/storage update in “Green” room in November 2022.

Administration

Have settled on cleaning service option to help maintain the church after Larry moves on to another phase of “retirement” in the near future.

As other projects are completed and cleaned, we are labeling power outlets and lines with appropriate power panel and breaker. Also adding to computerized drawings of our facility so future members have accurate and up to date documentation on facility assets.

Continuing relationship with Marathon Energy to stay on fixed rate plans for gas and energy usage.
