"You can't change your past, but you can change your response to it by speaking to your inner child differently."

After becoming a pastor, I attended a conference for new pastors. During the event, the instructor shared a cautionary tale about a church that experienced a division over the choice of carpet color, highlighting the risks of discord and schism within a local congregation. She noted that some people preferred a red carpet due to its association with Jesus' blood. Some others insisted on a blue carpet because it symbolized heaven and was more effective at hiding dirt on the floor. I thought it would be a made-up story because the issue seemed too trivial to me, but she confirmed it was a true story. She also shared her own experiences of managing conflicts within her church, where minor issues later escalated into significant disputes.

The way she resolved the conflict was inspiring because it could be universally applied to any situation. You may have heard of the important factors in resolving conflicts such as actively listening to all parties involved and identifying the mutually agreeable compromise. As she built common ground, she engaged in personal conversations with individuals from each group to hear their stories rather than their arguments. During the conversation, she asked them, "Why is it important to you?"

Through her conversations with each of them, she realized that it was not about the color of the carpet but about confronting their own egos, for example, their unresolved childhood relationships or traumas. When they heard the words of disagreement, the emotional pain of rejection from their childhood was triggered in the conflicted situation, which reminded them of their damaged self-esteem once again. By listening to their stories and encouraging them to share them in random adhoc groups in the leadership, tension was reduced and all of them learned how to treat minor things appropriately.

We all live with these kinds of traumas from our past experiences one way or another. They resurface in times of conflict, stress, or anytime we feel emotionally vulnerable and insecure. In a sense, Christian faith both allows us to anticipate future blessings and address past traumas, helping to give ourselves the love, care, and validation that we didn't receive during our childhood.

I guess every season can be a good season for finding the unsung songs in ourselves we are meant to sing. But summer is the best season to explore it or cultivate our ground as we are surrounded by the season's vibrant energy. As you know, I visited Korea for two weeks at the end of May through early June for family time, but it was also an opportunity for me to revisit my past struggles and unbearable challenges I faced in my younger years. I thank God for turning those experiences into something beautiful in myself to help me choose empathy towards others over judgment. Because of my own unfortunate circumstances in the past, I firmly believe what St. Augustine said, "The church is not a museum for saints, but it is a hospital for sinners."

Many psychologists and therapists suggest that we need to talk to our inner child, not figuratively but literally. Recall a childhood moment when you experienced emotional distress and heard your negative inner voices. For example, I heard a story about a man whose father was abusive to his mother. During their fights, his mother used to send him, who was the youngest, out of the house while his four older sisters remained in the house. When evening came, his sisters came to the park where he hid himself all day and said to him, "If you were a real man, you should have protected mom, instead of running away from her." Growing up, he has found himself avoiding confrontation and direct conflict with anyone because he was afraid.

His therapist suggested that he talk to his inner child who was scared in the park and was blamed for not doing his part to protect his mother. The therapist asked, "If you could speak to yourself as a child in such a moment, what would you like to tell yourself that might have helped you during the abuse?"

It is the same question for anyone who grew up with a parent who expressed hateful words to him/her or who had gone through difficult situations that harmed his/her positive self-esteem. Of course, you can't change your past, but you can change your response to it by speaking to your inner child differently. You can look into the eyes of your inner child and say this to him/her,

"It is not your fault and has never been your fault."

"You did nothing wrong."

"I want you to know that you deserve better from your parent."

"You are wonderfully and beautifully made as Psalm 139:14 says."

May you experience the joy of reconnecting with your inner child as a cherished summertime blessing this year. Acknowledge and validate his/her emotions. Identify and challenge the negative self-talk you grew up with. And rebuild your health and practice self-care because God wants you to be whole.

A man who grew up in foster care and who has 5 adopted children who were in foster care began a program called "Comfort Cases." Book bags or duffels are pre-filled with items for the foster kid: pjs, hygiene kit, blanket, book, and a stuffed animal.

A woman who grew up in her teenage years in foster care in PA, said,
"To carry your stuff in a trash bag, it makes you feel like this is your fault,
you're worth nothing, none of this stuff is worth anything to anyone else."

The Mission and Social Concerns Team is in contact with Social Services in Wayne County. We are discussing starting such a program in Wayne County. We will have more information about this project in future Spires, in announcements, and on Facebook.
