For such a time as this!"

This phrase originates from the Book of Esther (4:14) in the Old Testament, which describes the story of Esther, a young Jewish woman exiled in Persia with many other Jews in the Persian capital of Susa. As Esther was chosen to be the new queen, her uncle, Mordecai, discovered a plot to kill all the Jews in the empire by Haman, who was one of the king's advisors. Mordecai persuaded Esther to use her position as the queen to speak to the king about the plot, but she knew that she would risk her life to come to the king, because the Presian law prohibited anyone from approaching the king without being summoned. While Esther still hesitated to approach the king, Mordecai reminded her that she might have been placed in her position by God for a reason and said, "Who knows that you have come to the royal position for such a time as this?"

It may sound too pastoral, overly idealistic, sentimental, or even fatalistic, but I truly believe that God has put us in a specific time and place for a reason. Our existence is not random but is part of God's purpose to fulfill a specific role. For example, growing up in a dysfunctional family yourself, you may be the only one who can understand the power of acceptance and help someone to start a healing journey. If your family adopted a child from abroad, you may be well-suited to support immigrants or refugees because you have a better understanding of their lives and struggles.

Generally speaking, I don't think God causes bad things to happen in our lives because they are mostly caused by the "power of sin" which entered the world to break the relationships between God and humans and between the people in the world. However, the grace of God never wastes a hurt in human experiences because God uses them for good, personal growth, and aspiration for the goodness of God to manifest itself. Otherwise, a broken reality would only pass down through generations.

God puts us in our time and place to accomplish God's purpose through us. We are called to be a healer for others with our own wounds, as Henry Nouwen called it, "A wounded healer." God called us together as a congregation for good works, according to Ephesians 2:10: "We are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for **good works**, which God prepared beforehand so that we may walk in them." Ephesians 4:31~32 adds more specific reasons, "to put away from you all bitterness and wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, together with all malice. Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you."

Won't you agree that God calls us as a church in this time and place for an obvious reason? Especially, in the world where bitterness, wrath, anger, wrangling, and slander are abundant, God calls us to be a different and alternative community of faith to seek reconciliation, to break a vicious cycle of anger and pain, and to "act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with God (Micah 6:8)." I personally am not interested in going to a church that forgets or ignores the reason for its existence in the world, but now I am a pastor and take full responsibility if we do not fulfill the purpose of God's call for us. Let us be more faithful to God's call to be the light and salt of the world in such a critical moment as this.

Family Promise of Wayne County (FPWC), New York, Inc.

Thank you to those who supported the WPC Pie Sales to benefit FPWC this past summer. \$750 was garnered from the pie sales made and donations made. By those who claim they can only eat pies, not make them!

FPWC is entering its second quarter of its 25-26 Fiscal Year. During the first quarter, the sale of the Day Resource Center in Lyons was completed. Thanks to the First Methodist Church of Newark at 301 South Main Street, we are now occupying second floor space at their facility for offices for our staff, meetings, and storage. Access to the FPWC offices is at the High Street entrance. As the staff schedules vary, please call ahead at (315) 665-0037 or E-mail (familypromiseofwaynecounty@gmail.com) to make an appointment.

The ROTH (Roof Over Their Heads) Program continues to help prevent homelessness of families who face imminent loss of housing.


Three Wayne County School Districts have entered into separate agreements with FPWC for assistance to families within their district and paid for by the district. Each district gets a single slot to be used towards a family's one-time financial assistance to obtain or sustain housing. The family will be given case management for 12 months by FPWC's care coordinator. (The districts receive funding from various grants and cost the district's taxpayers nothing.)

One family that is currently in shelter will be graduating from the housing program shortly. Another family came into the shelter program this past month. Six families are on the waiting list. After the interview and evaluation of waiting list families, two new families are anticipated to be selected to enter the program.

The FPWC staff continues to work part time. Obtaining sufficient funding to maintain the staff full-time is the top priority of the FPWC Board. The second priority is for the Board to obtain additional cash assets of \$175,000.00 in the FPWC end of Calendar Year 2025 Fund Raising Campaign. This is so FPWC can be considered financially stable enough to apply for and obtain funding from many more grant sources with large sums available. So, get your calculators out and see what the tax reduction you will get by donating to FPWC. And extend that into 2025 with a monthly, quarterly or semi-annual donation to enable FPWC to extend its efforts in helping the nearly or openly homeless families in Wayne County.

Coming up on **December 2** is **Roc the Day** through United Way's End of Year Appeal. FPWC is registered for this one day of donations. So, if you participate in United Way, please consider this opportunity to direct your giving to FPWC.
