Romans 12:3

"Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the measure of your faith."

Many Christians consider that the book of Romans is arguably the most significant in the Bible, as Martin Luther called it 'The chief part of the New Testament." John Calvin, whose theological framework had led to the development of the Presbyterianism, argued that one can find the whole of the scripture through Romans. I hope we may study the book of Romans together sometime during our Bible Study class.

In Romans, after discussing the core doctrine of Christian faith in the first part of the book until chapter 11, Paul deals with practical applications of the doctrine in the second part that begins with chapter 12. The thesis statement of the second part is in verse 1 and 2: "Offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, not following the pattern of this world." Then, Paul gives his first practical advice to the church of Rome in verse 3, "Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the measure of your faith."

Of course, there are many things we should consider about our boundary limits in our personal lives. For example, it is important for us to have high self-esteem to appreciate and value ourselves, but it doesn't mean that we must believe in our abilities to control ourselves, others, and/or situations. There is a limit to be drawn as a Christian, about which pastor Tim Keller said, "In the Christian gospel, deep humility and deep confidence are present at the same time. I cannot feel superior to anyone, and yet I have nothing to prove to anyone."

I believe Paul's advice is beyond a personal level and is true for the families, groups, and nations, as well. For example, did you know that pepper was a major cause, if not the sole cause, for the British invasion of India? Pepper was a luxury good even to be used as currency in 17th~18th century and was considered a symbol of social status for the upper-class in Britain. They invaded India for the purpose of acquiring spices because they believed it was permissible to control another country and exploit its resources, which reminds me of verse 3, "They thought of themselves higher than they should."

Eugenics might be another example in history. It was a scientific hypothesis in the 19th and 20th centuries as a form of discrimination, racism, and colonialism to suggest that human characteristics were different depending on the outcome of generic inheritance. It was a form of ideology to control the people in the margin in the name of "the improvement of human race," which tried to eliminate so-called "social ills" (individuals to be unfit) through involuntary sterilization, segregation and social exclusion. Can you believe that such inhumane practices like xenophobia, antisemitism, sexism, racism, colonialism, as well as justifications of slavery came into existence in the form of "scientific proof"? This practice reminds me of verse 3, "They thought of themselves higher than they should" in the name of science.

This fall, let us think of the meaning of Paul's first advice about living a Christian life as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God: "Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with your faith." As Paul himself confessed that he learned the secret of being content with whatever I have" (Philippians 4:11), let us learn to have the peace of God in our lives without thinking more highly of ourselves than we ought. Then, we may realize that Paul's previous challenges in chapter 12 actually talk about a quite radical and revolutionary Christian lifestyle, even though they sound naïve and passive, as he said, "Rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another. Do not be arrogant but associate with the lowly. Do not claim to be wiser than you are."

understanding how we can better harness fearful and anxious emotions

through sisterhood and scripture.

We launched our first circle meeting of the new year with twelve amazing women gathered together. We started a new Bible Study focusing on how to let go of fear and anxiety entitled <u>Strength in the Struggle</u>. This new format starts and finishes with a memory verse. Interestingly, when we read something, we may recall about 35%, however, if we memorize something we can recall it years and years into the future almost verbatim. For this reason, each lesson offers a memory verse. The power of this verse, if memorized, is that when there are times of stress, you can recall it as a source of strength and comfort. The memory verse for the first lesson, which focuses on 'Deliverance from fear', is found in Psalm 34:4 "I sought the lord, and he answered me and delivered me from all my fears".

It's strange to talk about fear as we calmly sit in chairs together, this safe space. The world is not crushing down on us, our hearts are not palpitating out of our chests, our rational self is not muddled beyond reason, we have no reason for flight or to shield ourselves from bodily harm. In the quiet of the room, we all reflected upon times, though, when we have experienced these traumatic emotions.



It was stated that fear is like false events that will happen. Not necessarily what truly will occur. It's like a loan shark, not someone who is part of your reality anymore. Money does not have to go to the 'shark', emotions don't need to be spent on the fear. The fear needs to be released, let go. No more value needs to

be given to it. Fear that you constantly internalize can destroy you. If allowed, it can affect your health and cause sleepless nights. Fear, if kept as part of your armor, creates barriers

from others and actual reality.

The kind of fear we hold as a child is shaped differently than the one as an adult. The fear of a monster under the bed, the fear of how much a child may be punished by an angry parent, or anxiety of entering a new situation can weaken the resolve of a child. Most of these fears dissolve or weaken as wisdom and experience take hold of reason as a child becomes an adult. However, we realize that the tactile fear that is experienced from a school shooting or an abusive environment are scares that through maturation do not diminish.





Adult fears of loss, bodily injury or isolation and even loss of safety can rob our steadfastness. Even spiders can rattle our resolve. We don't feel as invincible as we might have felt as a teen. Once the final development of the frontal lobe of our brains is formed, around 25 years young, we process situations with more lived and learned experiences, and we become wiser.

Perhaps we carry some ingrained fears from our childhood, but they are shaped differently. Perhaps we gain other fears as life goes on. We are each different and see and feel the world differently.

It is as we step back and look at these fears from a spiritual perspective that we can grasp resources to strengthen our resolve. Though some faiths have a threatening God with rath filled consequences to perhaps control, there are other faiths where trust, love and strength are garnished. Once with the Lord we are driven to do good work. We can lay the groundwork to guide others, not with fear, but with love and support. We are all human and our flaws are many. We do not need to fear the Lord, but trust. We can lean on the Lord to seek the answers and through that action, we are delivered from our fears. ~ Fear not for I am with you.
