It is almost always a fun conversation for me if someone begins it with a “Did you know?” question. Whether or not I know the answer, my answer usually is, “No, I didn’t know it,” to make the person happy and proud. In fact, I appreciate that there has been a lot of good information from such conversations. For example, babies are born with about 270~300 bones, but as a person reaches physical maturity, some bones fuse together to become single bones so that adults usually have only 206 bones. Did you know this interesting and informative fact? I hope you didn’t because I also want to be happy and proud.

With my engineering background, I am typically excited when I learn about new scientific facts. I recently learned about the velocities of the universe. I knew that the earth was moving at an average velocity of 30 km per second (18.5 miles per second) around the sun. That is an easy calculation if we know the distance between the earth and the sun and apply it to the formula for circumference. The earth travels about 584 million miles per year so you can divide it by how many seconds we have a year. You may think, “Is it why I feel dizzy these days?”

I believe you already know the fact that the earth is also moving by itself at a velocity of 460 meters per second. So, you are standing on the earth spinning in your position while the whole plate on which you stand moves around in a circular motion. Now you may feel really woozy and faint if I tell you that recent astronomical studies have found that the sun is not in a fixed position as it has been traditionally understood, but orbits around the center of the Milky Way Galaxy at an average velocity of 230 kilometers per second (143 miles per second). It means the earth is spinning by itself in circles around the sun at a high speed while the sun moves in linear motion at a speed eight times faster than the circling speed of the earth. Imagine the whole picture of it!

Then, we hope to live our normal life in perfect tranquility as if everything is balanced and calm in the universe. We go to the beach to run around with our dogs. We relax on the sand and listen to the waves. We have a picnic in the park to breathe the fresh air and enjoy the natural views. We try to stay up to date with the news while reading our favorite books. We enjoy the company of friends and family on these occasions and love to complain or gossip about things or people with them. However, consider the scientific facts above and how they may set the tone for all of your activities.

Isn’t it appropriate to think that, whether we find our lives regular and even boring, or we are going through difficult times, life itself is possible only by the grace of God who holds us in God’s hand and under God’s protection? Isn’t it more reasonable to think that the fathomless mystery of God’s work is played out, not just when we realize and appreciate it, but in every moment of our lives? If every moment is God’s moment that goes before, behind, and beneath our lives, isn’t it our proper response to believe that life itself is meant to reflect the God who cares and gives us special meanings in all we do? Whether we take our kids to school or eat lunch with a friend, whether it is another decent day or a day of disappointment, the essence of everything we see and do in our lives is to reveal the wonders of God’s creation.

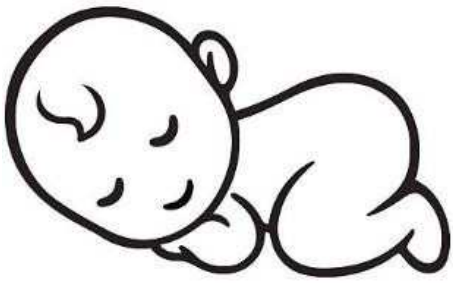

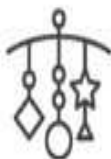


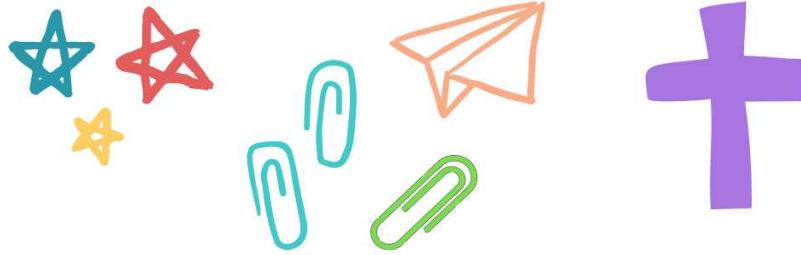

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Date: July 16, 2024

Present: Val Gendron, Eric Chapman, Bill Hassler and Alicia Lynch

We discussed the status of increasing our commitments to Mission. Currently it is determined by taking 10% of all pledges and many congregates feel this is inadequate. Eric C. has reviewed our accounts, noting that over half of the endowment is nonspecific or unrestricted in its spending requirements (versus the funds designated to the Edifice). Additionally, Eric feels that we can well afford many more dollars to mission projects no matter when in the year we decide to do so. Bill B. has also chimed in by email that all unused dollars will be sent to Presbytery if the church were ever to disband. We all agreed that many in our two communities could use some extra help, also past congregates leaving their dollars to WPC in their wills would probably have preferred to see the money working in our communities versus eventually the funds winding up in Presbytery. Alicia L. will ask Irene to locate her original budget request and perhaps, in September, Finance could take a look at the sources to take care of this increase.

In other business, Eric C. brought us up to speed regarding an error by our payroll company, Optima. Two forms were missing from the quarterly tax report filed in Sept. 2022. The forms were eventually sent in by Optima but because they were late, WPC was assessed a late fee of \$600. I have been talking to our rep, Victoria Steinmetz, for the better part of a year and she assures me that it has been "taken care of". We recently had a visit and phone call from agent Matruski from the NYS Dept. of Taxation and Finance. I'm not getting any place with Optima, so I have looked into a payroll service called Complete Payroll. Chapman Insurance uses the company, Complete Payroll, which they have used with no problems. He also called one of their references, Trinity Episcopal of Buffalo, and spoke to their bookkeeper who is very pleased with their service. We can still use the call-in service, or it can be done online. The big problem with making this change is the cost. Complete Payroll's quote for 7 employees was \$1,578.46 per yr. According to Val, our current cost with Optima is \$38 per pay period. Annualized for 26 pay periods, this is \$988. This is quite a bit less than Complete Payroll. The committee agreed that the extra cost would be worth it in the long run. As there was some confusion that Session needs to make this change, Alicia L. will bring it up at the Aug. 6th meeting.

Alicia will call Alan Rich to get moving forward on the church review and request that he sends us a list of articles that will be needed. Val and Alicia are planning to meet in September to start updating the list of Trust Accounts and take an inventory of the documents and where they are located.

And once again, we discussed the budget and the procedure with its creation. Currently, it is left up to Val to do and is completed very late in the year. Alicia L. will work on writing and distributing a form to committees showing the current status of each committee budget, giving us a much earlier look at the budget. It might be enlightening for committee chairs to plan out the year in advance. An October deadline would be our recommendation. It would be beneficial to have all pledges in earlier as well.

Food Cupboard

Janet M. and Sue P. will fill it on some of the mornings they walk, and when the cupboard is in need of replenishment.

With so many tending to the cupboard, we quickly run out of food.

Members of the community stop at the Food Cupboard and leave food. Members of WPC bring in food each month. One family brings in a large order. Another brings in dried milk, and another brings in packaged milk. Several pick up cereal and other items from a dollar store. The Food Pantry shares canned vegetables and surplus items from the Food Pantry.

The Lion's Club has shared donated applesauce given to them by Motts. The Women's Association donates food after the Rummage Sales. The Lion's Club has had one food drive in the spring and will have another in September. All of this helps, but there is a great need, and we need more donations to keep it filled.

Information about what food is needed for the cupboard will be posted on the bulletin board. There is a list of foods on paper sacks that were made when we first had the food cupboard.

We will continue to use Pal-Mac Neighbors and our Facebook pages to keep the community updated on the Food Cupboard. We will also include that cash donations may be sent to WPC with a notation – for the food cupboard.

Food Pantry

Ruth reported that she has had no trouble finding volunteers to help at the pantry. There are consistently 17-20 families coming each evening to the pantry. The Food Pantry received a \$12,000 grant from the Bullis Fund to use to buy freezers to be able to stock up on meat.

Weekend Wellness

The food pantry has made a commitment to Weekend Wellness and has continued to fill 78 bags for distribution this summer at the library. The food pantry will continue to support Weekend Wellness in this coming school year.

Wilma sent out a letter to groups who have supported Weekend Wellness in the past. She received \$2,000 from A.E.Y. Enterprises, Inc. The Mission Team will send out letters to other groups and businesses in the hopes of getting more donations. In the letter, Wilma let all know that last school year we gave away 3,278 bags. At \$8 a bag, that is about \$26,000.

It was suggested that we find out about a Bullis Grant – we have done one with matching funds for individual donations and 10% matching for church donations. Possibly King's Daughters would donate money to the project.

Other Fund-Raising suggestions were a Korean Dinner with sharing recipes and having a chili tasting. Cookies are a possibility for future years, not as a big fundraiser, but as information about Weekend Wellness.

The Finance Team asked for our proposed budget we made last fall. They will bring a recommendation to the Session to determine if Mission receives more money for mission work.

Weekend Wellness balance: \$4,000.

Good Neighbor Fund for June and July:

Checks written: \$4,600 – for 5 rents, 2 auto repairs 13 adults, 8 children

The Good Neighbor Fund received \$1,147.00 in a special offering taken at WPC for Christmas in July.

Neither the Presbytery nor the special offering moneys are in the deposits of July's report.
